He has also studied vocal performance, organ and conducting. Prior to his return to Hong Kong, he conducted choirs in Macau and in multiple locations in the USA. He has also been teaching courses and conducting choral workshops for over 200 church musicians in Hong Kong in the recent years. In addition to the Cecilian Singers, Andrew is also the music director of Vox Antiqua, which he founded and conductor of the Choir of the Standard Chartered Bank. He holds leadership positions at several churches in Hong Kong and sings with the Choir of St. John's Cathedral and Tallis Vocalis.

Paul Mealor's Programme Notes for Requiem – The Souls of the Righteous

Composed to mark the centenary of the end of the First World War, *Requiem: The Souls of the Righteous* is a meditation upon the terrors of war; on human suffering and on the power of the human spirit to transcend darkness. Over the last two years, the poet Grahame Davies and I have been writing our tribute to the fallen of World War I, and this Requiem blends together the traditional mass for the dead (sung in Latin) with new poems by Grahame (sung in English) which seek to celebrate peace and reconciliation.

Those who fought in the Great War undoubtedly experienced horror and pain, but through their letters it is clear that they still managed to find friendship and humanity and we felt it was important to have something pertinent and special in this work to reflect this. We were also acutely aware that in this centenary period, it is important that we remember the impact not only of the war but how it has shaped our relationship with peace.

From our own University of Aberdeen community, there was a battalion of young men who never came home and whose names are inscribed in our Chapel. As a teacher myself, it is hard to look upon my students and imagine them having to face such horror at such an early stage in their lives. We both hope the Requiem can provide a lasting University tribute to the courage they - and the millions of other from across all nations displayed and to the ongoing struggle for peace.

The work is in ten movements and lasts approximately 40 minutes. The tolling bells and lilting strings which open the work act as aural signposts throughout, constantly calling us to prayer and, in their own way, representing the passing of time - both unstoppable and most of the musical material employed structurally and harmonically throughout the piece, with one or two exceptions. One particularly being the third movement, "The Beatitudes." Here, Jesus' Sermon on the Mount acts as an interlude, a moment on which to reflect upon what "righteousness" truly is.

The music is constantly reflective and meditative but, twice, joyfulness in peace and friendship bursts out - in the "Gloria" and in the seventh movement, "Blessed be the Stranger." Here, the warrior and the victim, the friend and enemy are treated as one; as brothers and sisters. The penultimate movement, "If Ye Love Me," sets Jesus' words in the form of his final commandment. These are profound words. They are set very simply with off-stage voices - as if we are being spoken to from beyond.

The final movement brings back aspects of the first; but, this time, the choir is asked to play tuned wine-glasses. In my imagination, this represents a heavenly chord - music from beyond music, timeless, everlasting and forever.

The words for the final movement, written by Grahame Davis are:

"And let all those who leave our company, together or alone, find the strange road they follow takes them home

And let there be a heaven for those who find their way through hell and let there be forgiveness for those who broke before they fell.

A mystery all the greater for the answer, a darkness all the deeper for the star, a sunlight all the purer for the shadow, a beauty made more perfect by the scar."

Followed by the Communio from the Requiem Mass

"Let eternal light shine upon them, Lord, with your saints in eternity, because You are Holy"

Requiem: The Souls of The Righteous is dedicated, with great admiration, to Margaret Carlaw and Professor Derek Ogston CBE who have been wonderful champions of music in Aberdeen and of my own work, and it is also dedicated to all those who lost their lives in the Great War and all conflict.
